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1 Evaluating Coalitions (EvCo)

1.1 Aims of the EvCo

The main aim of this EvCo is to describe the proces of:

1. **formation** of coalitions and networks devoted to sexual violence in the nightlife environment in Spain, Portugal, and the Czech Republic.

The secondary aims of the EvCo is to explore the:

- 2. foreseen **goals of the coalition** and identification of the individual members with these goals,
- 3. capacity of the individual members to participate in the coalition,
- 4. capacity of the coalition as a whole to fulfill it's role in a given time,


in the three countries Spain, Portugal, and the Czech Republic.

1.2 Outcome

We expect the two main outcomes of the EvCo:

- Three case studies that will provide us with better insight into formation of the coalitions responding to nightlife-related sexual violence in Spain, Portugal, and the Czech Republic.
- Compare findings from the three countries and introduce a **case series** on forming coalitions in three differenent cultural, social, economical and political environment.

In the EvCo, we focus on the formation phase of the coalition. Capturing the formation phase may help us to understand the formation phase but also provide us with data that could used when studying the maintainance phase of the coalition in the future. See figure from Butterfoss & Kegler (2002) below.

1.3 Time line

The time line for the first wave of EvCo:

Contacting potential participants, data collection	January 2017 - March 2018
Transcription of the responses; translation of the open-ended questions in English; sending the raw data to CUNI	April 2018
Management and analysis of data, report translated to English for comparison	April – May 2018

2 EvCo: Methods

We plan to conduct an exploratory study using closed and open questions with the coalition and to-be-coalition members in the Czech Republic, Portugal, and Spain.

Part of the EvCo will also be collection of information from the representative of partners of this project (not covered by this manual).

2.1 Data collection tool

Data collection tool (Annex 2) should be translated by the partners to their local languages. Data collection tool may be prepared either in pen and paper form or in on-line form. CUNI is prepared to create the on-line version in different language mutations once provided with the translated Annex 2.

2.2 Data collection

Participants can fill in the questionnaire either during the coalition meeting or `at home`. Each option has its own pros and cons (e.g., no need to send reminders but less time to think about the answers when done during the meeting).

Template for transcribing data from the pen and paper form will be provided (available as a separate document).

2.3 Sample and sampling

Each centre has the following options to recruit participants from organizations that:

- a. represent organizations already active in the coalition.
- b. represent organizations that could become part of the coalition (try to seek these individuals actively).

Using methods of convenient and purposive sampling.



There is no specific number of participants to be included in the EvCo. However, an optimal number of participants is between 8-15 participants - members or to-be-members of the coalition.

You are advised to use the Informed consent form with each participant (Annex 1).
